'After my roles in Starter For 10 and She's Out Of My League I found myself increasingly branded a blonde bombshell. (I had dyed my hair from its natural shade of dark blonde for the roles.) My experience of being a blonde is that you get attention from all different types of people, both men and women. More importantly, though, you get more help; "Do you need this carried?" "Can I open this door?" "Let me sort that for you." I can't seem to work out if it's complimentary or patronising. My friends think of me as the archetypal blonde. interference, the better. I like that I can wear less make-up, too, so I just stick to clean skin and a light tan to give me a glow. Sarah Jessica Parker told me on the set of Sex and the City 2 that toners should be avoided at all costs, and when that woman talks about hair, you listen! She told me never to go there because it dulls every colour, and I've taken it as gospel.'

This, not so much ...

'The bright Nordic blonde I used to be showed up best on film (how it looks on the screen can be so different from real life), but unfortunately it required heavy bleaching. This compromised the integrity of the hair, causing it to break off, and for the first time my hair became damaged. Fewer women in LA are "beacon blondes" these days, and there's definitely a move towards a warmer, more textured blonde with dimension, concentrating on hair health.

'Since going a darker shade of blonde,
I've noticed my hair's health transform. I'll
always have to put heat on my hair, so when
I'm not working I've taken to not washing
it for as long as possible; I let it be and allow
the natural oils to come out. I've adopted
a new product regime of rich masks and
intense elixirs. Anything with argan oil is
like a tall drink for dry ends and even better
if you can leave it in to work its magic.'
